# THE ULPH CONNECTION

One of the events arranged for the day by Peabody was a competition for children from Ron the Aylsham Middle School. The children were asked to transport themselves back to the days of John Hook Ulph when he was landlord of the Cross keys Inn in Red Lion Street, and to write a short story about Red Lion St. as they imagined it to have looked like in 1864. As an alternative, they could draw a picture of the same scene. There were several entries, and the two successful entries were exhibited amongst the displays in the Town Hall. Both winning entries are reproduced in this issue of the Newsletter. Amongst the other items in the display, was a copy of the will of Jonathan Ulph, a millwright of Aylsham, who died in 1740. This was supplied by Miss Elaine Ulph of Costessey. By chance, a copy of the inventory of his household goods, compiled at the time of his death, is in the Worfolk Record Office, and we were able to exhibit a copy of that at the same time. Transcripts of both documents are also reproduced in this issue. As a spin-off, photocopies of the originals will eventually end up in the Town Archives.

Finally, if readers feel that they have had a surfeit of Ulphs, then the editor apologises and promises never to mention the name again — until they next pay a visit to Aylsham!

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# A MEMORABLE DAY IN AYLSHAM - 30th.MAY 1990 by Colin Ulph

Anyone who has ever been involved in organising meetings, conferences or parties will appreciate that they don't just happen! In the case of the gathering of ULPHs at Aylsham on 30th.May, the planning began as soon as the previous one at St.Ives ended thirteen months earlier

Much of the credit for the success of our "AYLSHAM ROOTS" day must go to your very own Ron Peabody, who co-ordinated things locally with almost military precision. Booking the Town Hall, handling media publicity, conceiving and arranging the John Hook competition for schoolchildren, organising our historical walk-about and the visit to St. Michael's, delving into the archives to put together a fascinating talk and display of documents and photographs — all were the work of the indefatigable Ron, and how well he did it! All that was left for me to do from my safe distance of nearly 200 miles, was to 'sell' the gathering to the Ulph families, liaise with the WI over the

tea arrangements and prepare the displays of family trees and memorabilia, the signing-in register and the badges by which we could all recognise each other.

A visit to Aylsham, three days before the event, enabled me to judge the competition, inspect the premises (how lucky you are to have such a spacious hall) and of course, make the acquaintance of Ron and Margaret — our first meeting after nine years of correspondence. We also spent a useful hour cleaning up the ULPH gravestones in the parish churchyard, ready for the ULPH invasion three days later.

As readers will have gathered, we had a The weather stayed dry and warm, very full day. and about 80 ULPHS and ULPH descendants enjoyed the events and the wonderful hospitality of Aylsham folk. They came from all over England: from Southport to Sussex, and Hull to Axminster in Devon; there was even one welcome visitor from Iowa, USA. It is a wonderful feeling to walk the streets trodden by one's ancestors, to see their homes and workplaces and to visit that magnificent church where they were baptised, married and buried. The feeling of belonging was enhanced on this occasion by the schools competition entries which really brought to life all we knew (and some we didn't) about John Hook Ulph, and his home, the Cross Keys in Red Lion Street. Well done to all who took part in that.

The programme proceeded like clockwork, which seemed appropriate because a prominent feature in the hall was a long-case clock, built around 1800 by Robert ULPH of Stalham, loaned to us (and later sold to us!) by Ray Norman Antiques of Diss. The discovery of the clock was one of the many good things to come from the excellent publicity given to us by the local media. Both before and after the event, I had letters and telephone calls from all over Norfolk, giving me fresh

pieces of information about the ULPHs. As a result, many gaps in the family records were filled, and several new participants have been added to the correspondence circle.

So thank you, Aylsham, for helping to make this one of our most enjoyable and worthwhile gatherings ever. We are grateful to Ron and his colleagues from the Aylsham Local History Society for feeding our thirsty minds, Elizabeth Purdy and the WI Marketeers for taking care of our tastebuds and bellies with that delightful tea, and of course John Pumphrey who tended our spiritual needs. Nothing was too much for any of them, and from the many letters I received afterwards, it was all much appreciated.

On behalf of my immediate family, I wish also to thank members of the Aylsham Methodist Church for the warm welcome they gave us at the family service on the preceding Sunday. We will all treasure our memories of a very happy day, and I am sure that many of us will visit you again before long.

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# JONATHAN ULPH of AYLSHAM (1705 - 1740) son of Benjamin & Mary ULPH

The following is a transcript of the will of Jonathan Ulph (transcribed by Elaine Ulph of Costessey) and an inventory of his goods at the time of his death.

In the name of God, Amen. I Jonathan Ulph of Elesham in the county of Norfolk, millwright, being sick and weak in body, but of sound and perfect memory, blessed be God, do make this my last will and testament in manner and form as following.

First, I commend my soul into the hands of Almighty God hoping for life and salvation through the merits and mediations of my Blessed Saviour and Redeemer, and my body I commit to the earth to be decently buried at the discretion of my executors, hereinafter named, and as to my worldly goods wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me, I dispose therof as followeth.

and first, I give and devise to my brother, Joseph Ulph one shilling.

Also, I give and devise all my several estates lying and being in Elsham aforesaid in those several manors there as they are, except that part hereafter named, unto Mary, my loving wife, and Mary Ulph, my daughter, and their heirs forever.

Also, I give all my goods, stock and chattels of what kind or nature soever they be, to Mary my wife and Mary my daughter, share and share alike.

Also I give unto my mother, Mary Bowers, my dwelling in my workshop in Elesham aforesaid, during her life, and after her decease to Mary, my wife, and Mary, my daughter as aforesaid.

And lastly, I make my mother, Mary Bowers, and Mary my loving wife executors of this, my last will and testament.

In witness whereof, I, Jonathan Ulph, the testator, have to this my last will and testament contained in one sheet of paper, set my hand and seal this twenty-sixth day of March 1740.

Jonathan Ulph

Signed, sealed, published and declared by the said Jonathan Ulph, the testator, as his last will and testament on this day of the date hereof in the presence of us whose names are hereunto subscribed in his presence and at his request.

# I WAS LOST BUT NOW I AM FOUND

(This is the prize-winning entry in the John Hook Ulph competition, won by Helen Webster, 39 Sir William's Close, Aylsham.)

John Hook Ulph looked at the empty street. Only sparrows hopped about, eating titbits. He swept the pavement outside, and then disappeared into the 'Cross Keys' Inn. John Hook Ulph was the landlord of the Cross Keys Inn. Everyone liked him, and he was kind to all children. He had short bow legs, a long body and the right side of his head was higher than the other. His wife was sick and had to stay in bed all the time.

Soon, shopkeepers all down the street had opened up their shops, and Red Lion Street became filled with people. But no one noticed a girl wander through the crowds and sit in the shadows of Peggs Yard.

"I'll have that, please"

"This one ?" he said, pointing to a cabbage.

"Yes, and one of those as well, thank you"

"Come on, Mary, in here. Stop dragging behind and put that back, John"

"I'll have a penny's worth of tea please"

"How much is that?"

The soles of her bare feet were hard, and her toe and finger nails were dirty and her hands and feet smelt. Her face was pretty, but that was underneath the dust, dirt and grime.

She rose from where she had been sitting, and pushed her way through the crowds and up an alley way, where she was alone. On a window sill some pies were cooling and bread rolls rising. Mr.Calth, the baker, must have left them there. She crouched under the window on the cold stone floor, and she felt so hungry that she couldn't resist. She reached up and took the nearest pie. It was still hot and she squealed; the baker turned around, and she ran.

"Stop her" Mr. Calth shouted.

She ran down the dark alley, and pushed through all the people. Someone grabbed her tattered dress and it ripped, but she kept running. She ran through all the gaps, and then found that she had run right into the Cross Keys Inn. He washed her all over including her hair, until she looked a different person. Then he took her inside and gave her a big helping of broth and a hunk of freshly baked bread and a glass of ale. He found her some clothes and

went with her to Mr.Calth's to apologise and pay for the pie. When they got back, he sent her to work as a maid for his wife, Sarah.

"Sarah, you don't mind Polly staying with us, do you? She has nowhere to go, and she is going to be a maid for you, as well. Someone to talk to"

"Like a companion, you mean?"


"Yes, and someone to bring up your meals and to help you"

"I should like that very much, bring her up to see me"
Polly and Sarah had a long talk, and were soon friends.

AYLSHAM DOCUMENTS - Paul Rutledge kindly sends a note to let us know that the following original documents were sold by auction at Phillips sale on 22nd.March '90 (lot 18) The documents are all connected with Aylsham.

Bond obliging John Brend, bellfounder of Norwich, to cast anew the great bell (1648)

Agreement with John Hobart, clockmaker, of Norwich for maintenance of chimes he had fitted to the bells for seven years. (1680)

Bond and agreement for recasting at Bracondale by Samuel Gilpin, Gent. of 5th & 6th.bells to make a ring of eight (1699-1700)

Agreement with Thomas Newman gent. of Norwich, for recasting treble bell. (1707)

Receipt by John Stephens for recasting 6th. bell. (1726)

Agreement by Thomas Newman, bellfounder of Norwich, for recasting 7th. bell. (1741)

Proposals for agreement with Thomas Osborn and Edward Arnold of St.Neots, Hunts., bellfounders, for recasting four treble bells. (1775)

Declaration by Sir John Hobart following order of Quarter Sessions that at the request of the chief inhabitants of Aylsham, he had set out  $14 \times 15$  yds. part of the Ollands belonging to the Bridewell as a common receptacle of water (1722)

although the originals have now been sold, photocopies exist in the Norfolk Record Office where interested members of the public may consult them.

HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION - Congratulations go to our Secretary, Valerie Belton, who has been invited on to the Committee of the Norfolk & Norwich Branch of the Historical Association.

AYLSHAM BAPTIST CHURCH - Following the article in the March 1990 issue of the Journal on the history of Aylsham Baptist Church, the Rev.B.Allcock, former Minister, reminds us that 1991 will be the 200th. anniversary of the founding of the Aylsham church (on 22.4.91) Students of Aylsham High School will be preparing a project to commemorate the bi-centenary, and Rev.Allcock is also preparing an up-date of the history of the church.

TOWN MAP - All of Peter Holman's detailed work on the Town Map is now completed and the finished product is available for all to see. A copy is displayed in the glass case on the end wall of the Town Hall. Those people who came to the open meetings held some time ago, at the Town Hall, can see the items of information which they supplied incorporated into the map, wherever Peter has been able to include it.

Not only can the map be seen there, but copies can be purchased and are on sale at the 'Rolling Pin' in Hungate St. Peter also says that members of the ALHS can purchase copies directly from him at the reduced price of £7. It is interesting to note that an enlarged and mounted copy of the map has been made by Broadland District Council and hangs on display in the Tourist Information Office in the Bure Valley Railway station in Aylsham.

DISPLAY CASE - The display case outside the Town Hall which contains the above map is a re-furbished version of the case originally installed by the Aylsham Association. The new case is now jointly owned by the Aylsham Association and the ALHS. It contains not only the map described above, but has two separate panels

which will contain publicity information for both organisations.

BURE VALLEY RAILWAY - The illustrated, guided walk round Aylsham, prepared by members of the ALHS for sale to users of the Bure Valley Railway are now available and can be purchased at Aylsham Station at 15p each. They are attractively produced and should earn a small, but continuing income for the Society.

NORFOLK HISTORY FAIR - The Society will be mounting a display at the forthcoming Norfolk History Fair at Gressenhall (on 15/16 Sept) Ivan Morris is masterminding the preparation, with some assistance, The displays will cover some publicity on the activities of the ALHS accompanied by the main display on a subject of Ivan's choice. What is that subject? - Come to Gressenhall on 15/16 September and see for yourself! Offers of help would also be welcomed.

## AYLSHAM IN 1706

In the Aylsham Parish archives there is a modern manuscript which is a transcription of an original document in the Norfolk Record Office. The document consists of a short heading followed by a list of names. It is a return made in 1706 of the number of communicants and dissenters, aged 16 and over, in the parish of Aylsham. It is one of a number of similar returns initiated by the church authorities, some of which were part of national surveys.

One such return for the Archdeaconry of Norwich in 1603 was published in Norfolk Archaeology, Vol.10. This return only gives population totals, not names. Other returns sometimes gave the number of communicants, plus the actual names of dissenters. This particular return of 1706 was made to the Bishop of Norwich at the time of his seven-yearly Visitation. Amongst the questions that the churchwardens had to answer, it says, "At the bottom, or on the back of the Bills indented of Births, Marriages and Burials, they are to set down the numbers of all the persons of both sexes. . .above the age of 16 years: how many are Popish Recusants, and how many Protestant dissenters, and of what persuasion."

Some parishes just gave the total number under each heading, others just named the dissenters, but nine or ten parishes wrote out a full list of all the parishioners' names. Fortunately for us, Aylsham was amongst the nine or ten who did this.

What follows, then, is a full list of everybody over 16 who was alive in Aylsham in 1706. i.e. all were born sometime in the seventeenth century. This makes it quite a unique and valuable document. There is no apparent order in the listing of names, so

for convenience, they have been re-arranged alphabetically. The handwriting in the transcript is almost certainly that of Dr.Sapwell, and is mostly, very legible, but a small number of names are not entirely decipherable, so some inaccuracies might exist:-

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## QUERIES AND NOTES

The Queries & Notes section on p.240 of the December '89 issue has produced a response from our former Chairman, Canon Jack Vyse, who writing from his home in Lincolnshire, comments on two of the queries:-

"Question 2 raises the old query about a sheep stealers grave in Aylsham churchyard. I think it originates from Arnold Tuddenham's tall stories, told for the benefit of visitors when he was Parish Clerk and Verger. There is, as far as I know, absolutely no evidence in the Registers to support the suggestion. suppose the idea is associated with the grave on the left, just beyond the vestry, with its iron grille which was restored some years back (1980-82?) by one of the Rowland sons. This grille is a fairly late example, presumably of precaution against "Ressurection men" - grave stealers, and the occupants of the grave seem innocent enough. The whole thing rests on a necessary falsehood - for if the man had been hanged. innocent or not, his body was highly unlikely to find a resting place in hallowed ground.

Page 241 - Question 6. Thomas Paske is certainly omitted, for some reason, from Sapwell's list of Vicars but is included, as you say, by Blomefield. His is one of the Coats of Arms of Vicars which we arranged in the south aisle windows, when they were restored. They were originally in the North choir aisle window behind the organ. I have a record of the Paske arms as - 'quarterly Argent and Sable, in the 2nd. and 3rd. quarters three fleurs-de-lys in pale Argent'. The initials TP are, as I remember, set on either side of the shield.

Like everybody else, I wish I could find an explanations for Sir William's Lane. The Paston suggestion remains attractive, but without any shred of evidence.

As far as Yaxley's Lane is concerned, there are quite a lot of people of that name in the Registers, and I suppose that — like Palmer — they probably had a holding nearby at some date, probably quite late. Similarly, who was Carr?, who, in the same sort of way, presumably gave his name to the area round the pump in the days before the pump existed.

### AYLSHAM IN 1879

This extract is from Kelly's Directory of Norfolk for 1879. This was the year that saw the beginnings of the 'Aylsham Derby'. It was also the year that marked the end of a traditional way of life for the townspeople - the following year - 1880 - the railway arrived!

AYLSHAM is a parish, market and union town, head of a county court district, and polling-place for the Northern division of the county, 125½ miles from London, 12 north from Norwich, 7 west from North Walsham, and 4 miles north-west from Buxton station on a branch line from Wroxham station on the North Walsham and Cromer line, which branch will be continued to Aylsham, on the banks of the river Bure, which is navigable hence to Yurmouth, in South Erpingham hundred, rural deanery of Ingworth, and archdeaconry and diocese of Norwich. The church of St. Michael, in the Early English and Perpendicular styles, was built by John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster, the court of whose duchy was once held in this town: it has tower with steeple, containing 10 hells; also clock and organ; the font is enriched with bas-reliefs of the four emblems of the Evangelists; the instruments of the Passion; and the arms of Gaunt, with other armorial insignia: the screens were painted with saints, martyrs and confessors in 1507, principally at the cost of Thomas Wyner, who, on his monument, is represented in a winding-sheet: here is a monument to Richard Howard, sheriff of Norwich, who, in 1488, built the church porch: the east window, the tracery. of which has been restored, is decorated with stained glass, representing the four most favoured disciples of our Blessed Lord, with various devices, and armorial bearings of the late Earl of Buckingham and heir of Blickling, the Bishop of Norwich, the Dean and Chapter of Norwich and Canterbury: a stained side window to the memory of eight former vicars; another contains some beautiful specimens of old glass, inserted at the expense of the Rev. E. T. Yates, late vicar, containing the armorial bearings of his family, and of the lay impropriator of the parish, S. Pitman esq. together with those of the Dowager Lady Suffield: in a recess in the churchyard, in a piece of lawn enclosed with iron rails, planted with roses, heartsease, and other flowers, is the grave of Humphrey Repton, the celebrated landscape gardener,

who died March 24th, 1818. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £685, with residence, in the gift of the Dean; and Chapter of Canterbury and held by the Rev. Charles Haughton Aitkens M.A. of Trinity College and New Inn Hall, Oxford. The Dean and Chapter of Canterbury hold. the great tithes, which are leased to S. Pitman esq. The register dates from the year 1653. The Baptists, Wesleyans, Primitive Methodists and Reformed Wesleyans have each a chapel. A free school was founded here in 1517 by Robert Jannys, mayor of Norwich in that year: it has £10 from the funds of King Edward VI.'s Hospital at Norwich: it is now conducted upon the National system : here is an Infant school, on the same system. Cressey's charity of £34 yearly is for clothing. The corn market is held on Tuesday, in the Corn Exchange. Fairs are held yearly on March 23 and last Tuesday in September, and a hiring for servants on the first Tuesday in October. One of the county Bridewells was formerly in this town, but has been converted into dwelling-houses. A Savings bank was established in 1818, and is open from 12 to 1 every Monday; here is also a Literary Institution and a Working Men's Club and Institute. A short distance from the town is a mineral spring. There are four manors, belonging severally to Constance Marchioness of Lothian, the Vicar, Thomas Copeman & W. S. Calvert esqrs. The landowners are Constance Marchioness of Lothian, R. J. W. Purdy esq. Charles Louis Buxton esq. J. P. E. J. C. Stracey esq. Mrs. Elizabeth Clover, the trustees of the Rev. James Bulwer, the trustees of the late W. W. Wickes esq. B. B. Sapwell esq. Rev. R. A. Rackham, Thomas Henry Case esq. and a few smaller owners. The area is 4,308 acres; rateable value, £12,422; in 1871 the population was 2,502 of the parish, and 2,346 of
