

# THE HATCHMENT OF JOHN JERMY IN AYLSHAM CHURCH.

Kenneth E. Jermy, MA, FSA.

Above the south door in Aylsham church is the hatchment of John Jermy of Bayfield, who died on 25th. October 1744. He married:-

- 1. Mary, daughter of Samuel Fuller.
- 2. Mary, daughter and heiress of the Rev. William Starkey.
- 3. Mary, daughter, and co-heiress of Sir Benjamin Wrench.

The hatchment bears three shields. The central one shows Jermy impaling Wrench, to the dexter is Jermy impaling Fuller, and to the sinister is Jermy with Starkey in pretence.

The dexter shield is described by Summers as

Argent a lion rampant guardant (Jermy) impaling Quarterly 1 and 4, Argent three bars and a canton gules (Fuller) 2 and 3, Or fretty sable on a chief azure three molets or ( ).

The authority given for this is Farrer.2

But Farrer gives for the second and third quarters of this impaled shield: Or a fret sable on a chief of the second three mullets of the first.

John Norton,<sup>3</sup> from the records of the Norfolk Heraldry Society, points out that Fuller of York Place, Surrey, bore: Argent three bars and a canton gules. A footnote to Farrer's entry for Aylsham explains that the arms of Mary Fuller were - Fuller quartered with Fuller of Yarmouth. Norton's records have two descriptions for Fuller of Yarmouth: Or fretty sable on a chief sable three pierced molets or, and Or fretty sable on a chief sable three molets or pierced of the field.

The hatchment at Aylsham is high upon the wall and very poorly illuminated. In such conditions sable and azure may very easily be confused. The weight of evidence, therefore, is that Mary Fuller's arms were the main Fuller shield quartered with Fuller of Yarmouth. The description in Summers of the dexter shield on the hatchment should read:-

Jermy impaling: Quarterly 1 and 4, Argent three bars and a canton ggules, 2 and 3, Or a fret sable on a chief sable three molets or pierced of the field (Fuller).

# SOCIETY NEWS

VISIT TO OTLEY HALL AND LAVENHAM - Once again Betty Gee successfully organised a most enjoyable outing. She richly deserves our thanks. We left Aylsham at 9am. for Lavenham. The sky was overcast and rain threatened, but as we drove into Suffolk the sky brightened, the fields blazed with poppies and were misted with linseed and the sun shone gently on the pink washed cottages. We were met at the Guildhall of Corpus Christi by our guide who was to give us a brief talk. She was excellent, clearly a knowledgeable enthusiast, and mercifully succinct.

The Guildhall suffered at the dissolution of the monasteries when the guilds were disbanded. As there was no money for its upkeep the magnificent building fell into disrepair. So rotten were the walls that when it was later used as a Bridewell, prisoners could escape through the cracks. Luckily, wealthy benefactors stepped in and the building was saved and sensitively restored. When it was eventually handed over to the National Trust there was a proviso that it should be available to the citizens of Lavenham. The Great Hall is left unfurnished so that it can be used by local organisations. The museum was marvellous. A simple smock reminded us of the stark simplicity of rural life - so lauded by the poets. There were, in contrast, poignant reminders of the grim reality of the agricultural depression. The skill of the weavers was clearly shown and the effects of foreign competition. There was so much to see that we could well have spent the day there,

but time was limited. As we walked through the streets of Lavenham we cast envious eyes at the many quaint, desirable residences. Lavenham did seem to be quite unchanged, but of course it had. There were now no open sewers filling the air with foul odours. It has become a tourist attraction and ever so slightly 'twee'. The church of SS Peter & Paul is magnificent - an architectural gem.

The journey to Otley Hall was slightly longer than planned, because of a low bridge - too low for our coach! However, our driver found another route and we arrived only ten minutes late. Otley Hall is the home of Nicholas Hagger and his wife, Ann. The house is described as a perfect example of unspoilt late-mediæval architecture, and all the features of the house were particularly impressive. For the tour of the house and gardens we were divided into two groups. Both guides were excellent, but rather verbose and anecdotal. The gardens contain parts of an important design by Francis Inigo Thomas (1866-1950). More mundanely, cleverly tucked away, were a tennis court and a swimming pool. Our visit ended with an excellent tea of home-made cakes and biscuits, and we arrived back in Aylsham tired, but well-pleased with our day's outing.

Now, there are no members of the family left in Aylsham, but there are many descendants on the other side of the world in Australia. In future issues of the Journal I am hoping that there might be other articles from Margaret telling us more about the Starling family. See page 331 for this first contribution.

# **OULTON CHAPEL**

## Tom Mollard

Earlier in the year, the society was asked, informally, if it would assist in, or undertake a survey of the surviving memorials inside and outside Oulton Chapel - the former Congregational chapel now in the

care of the Historic Buildings Trust. Boldly, we volunteered to undertake the survey as we were the nearest historical society to the chapel. After asking for volunteers, a group comprising Ann Dyball, Gill Fletcher, Geoffrey Gale, Tricia Hawkins and Tom Mollard agreed to undertake the job.

An initial reconnaissance suggested that it could be quite a task. Those inscriptions outside that we could see were worn and faint, and those we could not see were buried under masses of weeds and vegetation. On June 18th. we descended on the chapel. Several things cheered us up straight away. Firstly, it was a brilliant sunny day, ideal for working, and to our delight, some kind person had cut down all the weeds and thistles the day before we arrived, and made everything much more accessible. We never did discover who had cut back the vegetation, but we were indeed grateful. Fortunately, also, the worn and faint inscriptions became easier to decipher as we progressed and gained experience. I was pleased, at the end, to think that we had been able to decipher and record every inscription. Only one stone defeated us. This was a ledger stone inside the building. As it was positioned immediately inside the entrance door, a hundred years of footsteps of members of the congregation had erased practically the whole inscription. Fortunately, a nearby memorial set in the wall, had repeated everything that was originally on the ledger stone, so we had no problem.

At the end of the exercise, we have a typed list of all the surviving inscriptions and an index of all the names mentioned. At the time of writing we still have to match the details in the list with a set of photographs of each memorial stone. These photographs were all carefully taken by Geoff Gale, and we are grateful to him for his expertise. Hopefully, by the time you are reading this, it will all be complete and handed over to the Trustees of the Chapel (headed by Mary Manning). A copy should also end up in our archives.

There are only thirty six memorials in all, so the scale of the job was relatively small, but our inexperience and general decrepitude (speaking only for myself of course) made us take longer. I suspect that

there could be more memorials on the site which are lost or buried, but we could only record what we could see. The chapel bears the date 1728 prominently on its front wall, and one would imagine that there would have been many more burials in total over that period.

The earliest recorded date is that for Thomas Sandling [d.1798] and the most recent was 1999. Sadly, between starting and finishing the survey we recorded the interment of the ashes of May Cutting. May Cutting was the wife of Mr. Cutting whose family lives in the former manse next to the chapel. Generations of the family are already buried there.

There are many sad reminders of the harsh times of years ago, particularly the number of infant deaths recorded. It also seems remarkable to see the large numbers of former pupils of Oulton school recorded in the Roll of Honour of men who served in the 1914-1918 war, and to see how many of these lost their lives. I hope our survey helps to perpetuate their names.

# THE STARLING FAMILY SINCE 1937 Margaret Keable

The most difficult aspect to this was where to start? I decided it was best to give some background information first.

William Starling was born in 1820/21 in Buxton, near Aylsham, I believe. In the 1841 census entry for Buxton I found the following:

William Starling	20 years	Basket maker
Mary Starling	15 years	
James Starling	8 years	
Elizabeth Starling	80 years	lodger

I had ordered the 1841 census film because I had thought that I would find the names of William Starling's parents, but to my surprise I found that at the age of 20, William was the head of the house and was responsible for his younger siblings. Obviously the parents must have both died. The other surprise was that in 1841 William was not living in the town of Aylsham as I had supposed. In the 1851 census he had given his place of birth as Aylsham. After viewing the Aylsham parish records on film, I discovered that he wasn't in those records.

William does appear on the 1851 census records as living in Aylsham and the record states:-

Obviously, at some stage between 1841 and 1851, William Starling moved into Aylsham, also Mary is no longer living with her brother.

According to the Aylsham parish records, Hannah gave birth to two children. In 1849 William Starling was born and died soon after. He was followed in 1851 by William Frederick Starling. There were no other children for Hannah and William. William Frederick, or Frederick William as he was sometimes known, followed in his father's footsteps. William had become the local ironmonger and Frederick William eventually took over the family business.

In 1876 Frederick William married Catherine Annie Corney by licence, in Ipswich. They had four children, all girls - Mabel Grace and Ethel Agnes, twins, both baptised on November 2nd. 1877 [Ethel Agnes was my grandmother] and Maud Mary, baptised March 10th. 1879 and Kathleen Constance baptised August 31st 1890.

I will now start the Ethel Agnes Starling story - my grandmother's story, and the story of the Starlings since 1937. Ethel

was a governess to a family called Debney for a time prior to her marriage. I am now in contact with the great grand-daughter of the Debney family whose children she looked after. She maintained contact with the Debneys and became great friends with them once she was married and had her own children.

Ethel Starling and her future husband, William Keable, would apparently meet half way between Earlham, where William lived, and Aylsham in their courting days. My father said they enjoyed ice skating at Blickling. On April 15th. 1903 Ethel Agnes Starling and William Keable were married in the parish church at Aylsham. Their families were present: William Frederick Starling, William Keable and his wife, Agnes were witnesses at the marriage. William and Ethel had their first child in 1905. They named her Rees, which was a family name of Catherine Annie's. William and Ethel moved to Horning and farmed there. The farm was called "The Grove" and the rest of their family was born there.

Enid was born in 1909, Irene and Gerrard (twins) were born in 1910; Gerrard died as an infant. William Murray was born in 1914; William Murray, or Murray, as he is known, is my father. Eric John, the youngest child, was born in 1918 and he was known as John or Jack. The family lived at Horning until 1923. My father said that the farm was around 800 acres, and that his father employed a number of men. Farming was very labour intensive in those days.

Dad has many memories of his grandfather, William Frederick. He used to grow strawberries and always gave the first of the crop to his grandchildren. Dad and his brother and sisters used to visit Aylsham frequently and enjoyed being with their grandparents. William Frederick had a few acres apparently, and had a big orchard with many varieties of apples growing. Dad also recalls William Fredericks' boat and how he enjoyed taking people out in it. His Grannie Starling was nearly blind. She had some problem with her eyes, but this did not stop her from doing fine needlework. The Starlings were a very devoted couple.

In 1926 William Keable decided to emigrate to Australia. Farm prices were down and he thought his sons would have more opportunities in Australia. Rees, his eldest daughter was getting married, and Irene was working, so they stayed in England. Their grandparents, the Starlings, were their base from then on.

In August 1926, William Keable, his wife Enid, his daughter and his two sons Murray and John arrived in Australia. Over the next twenty years William Keable worked on a number of big properties, often in a managerial capacity, in Victoria and New South Wales. Ethel found the Australian climate difficult and missed her family in Aylsham, in particular her twin sister.

With the outbreak of the second world war, both Murray and John enlisted - Murray in the army and John in the Royal Australian Airforce. John remained in Australia for the duration of the war, whereas Murray was sent to New Guinea to help stop the Japanese advance. He was also in Darwin, Australia, when the Japanese bombed it. At the end of the war both Murray and John applied for, and received, Soldier Settlement farms. Murray's farm was near Ballarat in Victoria, and John's was in New South Wales. Murray married Marion Ervin in 1946 and moved to the farm where they had to live in a one-room hut for a number of months while their house was being built. John had married during the war and in 1946 his son was born.

William and Ethel came to live with Murray on his farm and remained there until they died. Ethel (formerly Starling) died in 1951; William died in 1957. Both are interred at Skipton cemetery which was about 8 miles from the farm. Enid, their daughter, did some nursing and then married a grazier on the Mornington Peninsula. She had two children, Elma and Peter. William and Ethel had lived on the Mornington Peninsula during the war years, and it was there that William started up his Ryeland Sheep Stud. Both Murray and John continued raising Ryeland sheep on their farms, following the war. In fact the Stud is still in existence. One of William and Ethel's great grand-daughters is now breeding Ryelands.

Murray eventually retired into Ballarat. He had four children, but none of his children are on the land. His eldest has a small business in Western Australia, I am a teacher at a secondary school; his other daughter, Anne, is a kindergarten assistant, and his son, Eric, is a computer technician. John's children both have farms in New South Wales, and most of his grandchildren are connected to the land. In New South Wales, where the farms are, they have a very limited rainfall, and consequently have to rely on irrigation for their crops. They grow rice and have cattle and sheep. Most of Ethel and William's grandchildren have children. Some of these are still at school, and some are working. The Australian Starling/Aylsham connection is going strong here. In fact William Frederick would be a great, great, great, grandfather later this year.

Back in England

As I stated earlier, Rees and Irene remained behind in England. [William Frederick's grand daughters]. Rees married Eric Edwards who worked in his family business, and was a Major in World War Two. They had no children. Rees died about ten years ago after having lived in Norwich all her married life. Irene did clerical work and in 1949 emigrated to Australia. My father sponsored her. She worked for Dalgetys (a pastoral firm) until she was 65. Eventually she became the secretary for the head of the firm. Irene died in 1984 and was interred in Geelong cemetery.

William Frederick, the ironmonger - our Aylsham connection died in 1937. His wife Catherine Annie died during the Second World War and was in her nineties when she died. Mabel Starling never married and continued to live in Aylsham until her death in 1962. Maude married briefly, but had no children and returned and lived with her parents initially, and then with her sister, Mabel, until her death in 1963.

Kath, the youngest had a good voice and Frederick William paid for her to go to Europe to have singing lessons. Kath entertained the troops during World War 1, sang in London in a number of productions and came to Australia with Dame Nellie Melba in 1911 to sing in Melbourne and Sydney. Kath did marry, an American, and lived in

America until his death. She then returned to England and eventually died in Aylsham in 1972.

Of the four children of William Frederick Starling only Ethel had children. Once Ethel emigrated to Australia, taking most of her children with her, it was only a matter of time before the English branch of the Starlings ceased. However, whilst my father lives, the memories of Aylsham live on.

### **AYLSHAM IN 1908**

Our trawl through the county directories brings us up to the year 1908 and closer to modern times. The following extract comes from Kelly's directory of Norfolk.

AYLSHAM, mentioned in Domesday as "Elesham," is a market and union town, head of a county court district and parish, on the banks of the river Bure, which is navigable hence to Yarmouth, having a station on the Great Eastern railway and another on the Midland and Great Northern joint railway, and is 12 miles north from Norwich, 7 miles west from North Walsham and 1251/2 from London in the Northern division of the county, South Erpingham hundred and petty sessional division, rural deanery of Ingworth (South Division) and archdeaconry and diocese of Norwich. The town is lighted with gas supplied by the Aylsham Gas Co. Limited, there is no water supply except from wells. The church of St. Michael is a building of flint in the Decorated and Perpendicular styles, and was erected c.1380 by John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster, the court of whose duchy was once held in this town; it consists of chancel with aisles and vestry clerestoried nave of six bays, aisles, transepts, south porch, with parvise, and an embattled western tower with crocketed pinnacles and a small spire, and containing a clock and 10 bells, re-hung, and the belfry repaired, in 1890, at a cost of £285: the chancel retains three sedilia and a double piscina, and there are also piscinæ in the south aisle and the south transept: the font is

enriched with bas-reliefs of the emblems of the four Evangelists, the instruments of the Passion, and the arms of the Duke of Lancaster, with other armorial insignia: of the rood screen, erected in 1507, principally at the cost of Thomas Wymer, worsted weaver, only the lower part now remains, and is adorned with painted figures of apostles and martyrs, and has an inscription in Latin to Thomas Wymer and Joan and Agnes his wives: the remains of the former arcading of the screen are now incorporated in the reredos, constructed out of carved wood from various parts of the church: the tomb of Wymer, with brass effigy in shrouds and the date 1507, is in the church: here is also a brass, with effigies as skeletons in shrouds, to Richard Howard, citizen and sheriff of Norwich, who, in 1468, built the church porch, and died 13th Jan. 1490, and to Cecilia, his wife: there are other brasses to Thomas Tylson B.A. rector, c.1490. with effigy in almuce and scrolls; and to Robert Farman and Katherine, his wife, c. 1490, and there are effigies of a man and his wife much worn: the church also contains monuments to the families of Jermy, Drake, Wrench, Norgate and Rushburgh, and there is a monument. somewhat mutilated, to John Jegon S.T.P. Bishop of Norwich from 1602, who died 13 March, 1617: the east window, the tracery of which has been restored, is decorated with stained glass, placed in 1842-3, and representing apostles, with various devices and the armorial bearings of the Hobarts, Earls of Buckinghamshire those of the See of Norwich, impaling Stanley, the Duchy of Lancaster, and others: there is another stained window to eight former vicars, and one containing some beautiful specimens of old glass, inserted at the expense of the late Rev. E. T. Yates, a former vicar, together with the armorial bearings of his family, and of S. Pitman esq. then lay impropriator of the parish, and the Dowager Lady Suffield: the organ was presented by the Rev E T. Yates, who also contributed to the restoration of the church in 1852: the pulpit dates from about 1600: the eagle lectern is modern: there were once several chantries in this church, one of which was founded 8th. July, 1534, by Robert Jannys, who also founded the Free School: the Communion plate includes a chalice and paten of 1567, besides other pieces of later date: in a recess in the churchyard is the grave of Humphry Repton, the celebrated landscape gardener, who died 24 March, 1818: there are 850 sittings. The register dates from the year 1653. The living is a Vicarage, net yearly value £290, including 5 acres of glebe. with residence, in the Gift of the Dean and Chapter (of Canterbury), and held since 1888 by the Rev. John Gurney Hoare M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge. Hon. Canon of Norwich, Rural Dean of Ingworth (Southern division), and surrogate. The Ecclesiastical Commissioners hold the larger portion of the great tithes. A mission room was built in 1890, on ground adjoining the churchyard at a cost of £400, by Mr. B. Cook, who receives a small rent for its use as a parish room. The Baptist chapel is in White Hart street, it was founded in 179I and has

sittings for 450 persons: there is a Primitive Methodist chapel on the Cawston road, a Wesleyan Methodist chapel in White Hart street, a Reformed Wesleyan chapel in Millgate and a Gospel hall on the Cawston road; adjoining Mr. Philip Shepheard's residence is a catholic chapel, in which services are held occasionally. The Cemetery, of two acres, formed in 1855 at a cost of £600, was enlarged in 1900 by the addition of 11/2 acres. and is under the control of the Parish Council. The Town Hall, in the Market place, now the property of the town, is a structure of red brick, and has a reading room and Literary Institute attached. A fire brigade is maintained here. Fairs are held yearly on March 23rd and last Tuesday in September. Cressey's charity of £31 6s. yearly is given in dole; and is under the control of the Parish Council. Abbots Hall, erected in 1610 by a member of the Wood family, and now the property of Philip Candler Shepheard Esq. J.P. stands on the site of the ancient moated residence, and is occupied as a farmhouse. There are four manors. Aylsham Lancaster manor belonging to the Marquess of Lothian, the Vicarage manor, belonging to the vicar; Sexton's manor, commonly called Aylsham Wood, the property of the trustees of the late Thomas Copeman Esq. and Bolwick manor, belonging to W. S. Calvert Esq. Orchard House is the property of Frederick Little Esq. The principal landowners are the Marquess of Lothian, Robert John Woods Purdy Esq. Mrs Louis Buxton of Bolwick; Philip Candler Shepheard Esq. Col. Benjamin Beckham Sapwell, the Rev. William James Stracey-Clitherow. of 50 Portland Place, London. W. Walter Redfoord Bulwer Esq. Mrs. Sapwell, the trustees of the Rev. Robert Alfred Rackham M.A. (d. 1903), B. Cook Esq. and Lieut-Col. E. R. A Kerrison R.A., C.M.G. of Burgh Hall, and a few smaller owners. The area is 4,305 acres of land and 25 of water; rateable value, £11,226; in 1901 the population of the parish was 2,471, including 10 officers and 130 inmates in the workhouse.
